| TERM | GENERAL DEFINITION |
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| Bimah: | Raised platform in a synagogue from which the Torah is read |
| Challah: | A braided egg bread common among Jews and used on Shabbat as a symbol of <br> the sustenance provided by God |
| Choseness: | Obligation of Jews to serve as humanity's representative to God, and God's <br> representatives to humanity; requiring model behavior as elaborated in the 613 <br> mitzvot. |
| Covenant: | Promise made by God to Abraham to protect and provide for him and his <br> descendants in exchange for his recognition of God as the One God. |
| Daven: | Jewish prayer, which includes bodily movement as well as spoken prayer |
| Halakhah: | (Trans: "the going," as in a path or road); system of mitzvot ("commandments") <br> and the rules / traditions surrounding how to obey them |
| Heksher: | Marking / symbol placed on food packaging to indicate it has been inspected by a <br> rabbi or board of rabbis and judged to be kosher |
| Kashrut / Kosher: | System of dietary restrictions commanded by God, described in the Jewish sacred <br> texts and elaborated over centuries by rabbis |
| Kippah / <br> Yarmulke: | Skullcap worn by Jews as a sign of humility before God <br> Mitzvah: |
| (Trans: "commandment"); one of 613 commanded in the Torah (plural: mitzvot) |  |
| Rabbi: | (Trans: "my teacher"); religious teacher / judge - in the modern world: the head <br> of a congregation |
| Shema: | (Trans: "Listen!"); central prayer in Judaism, proclaiming the one-ness of God |
| Tallit: | Prayer shawl worn by adult Jews during morning prayers when the Torah is read; <br> carry fringes (tzitzit) on each corner, as commanded |
| Talmud: | Commentary / exploration of issues and themes from the Torah as they relate to <br> halakhah |
| Tanakh: | Jewish sacred text, made up of the Torah, the works of the prophets (Nevi'im), <br> and the "Writings" (Ketuvim) |
| First 5 books of the Jewish sacred text; often referred to as the "Five Books of <br> Moses" (known in the Christian world as Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, and <br> Deuteronomy) |  |
